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Association News

2022 ISHS Membership and Finances

The International Society for Humor Studies had a good year in 2022 with 182 affiliates, including 173 new and returning members and 9 additional Board Members and Consulting Editors of the journal, *HUMOR*. At the October 31 close of 2022 membership, the Society was again financially sound with \$74,619.44 in unaudited revenue including \$61,266.44 carried over from 2021 and \$13,353.00 from 2022 membership dues and fees. Operating expenses for 2022 included \$1,426.82 for online services, \$155.00 for service awards, and \$10,647.00 for membership subscriptions to *HUMOR: International Journal for Humor Research*. Revenue over expenses by the end of 2021 is estimated to be \$62,390.51.

Between December 1, 2021 and November 30, 2022, Holy Names University received an additional \$1,330.06 for the ISHS Scholarship fund. On October 31, the scholarship fund held \$19,652.19. From the scholarship fund, the Society made one \$3,100.00 Scholarly Contribution Award plus two \$500.00 and two \$300.00 Graduate Students Awards at the 2022 ISHS Conference in Bertinoro Italy. As always, I would like to thank the members who made contributions to the ISHS Scholarship Fund, and I would welcome others to make donations with their 2023 membership applications for future scholarships.

We look forward to another great year in 2023 with the publication of the 36th volume of *HUMOR* and, assuming the relaxing of COVID-19 restrictions, the Society's 33rd international conference at Boston University from July 3 to July 7, 2023. You will be able to register and submit paper proposals for the 2023 Conference online at the Conference website in January 2023. If you would like to host the next or a future ISHS Conference, you can contact me for more information on how to submit a Conference proposal.

You can join the Society or renew your ISHS membership for 2023 on the Society's website at www.humorstudies.org. On the membership page, you will find a link that will allow you to renew your membership. On the online application form, you will see the Society's current fee structure, which offers membership with either an online or print subscription to the Society's journal, *HUMOR*. For the current year, *HUMOR* will have more original research articles, and print subscribers will receive online access to the 2023 *HUMOR* book reviews, which will be published only online. Membership is still \$69 with an online subscription and \$130 with a print subscription. Subscribing members who join or renew by January 31 can take a \$5.00 discount. Please note that renewal includes a 3% plus \$1 processing fee. If you do not wish to receive the journal, but do wish to be a member to receive our other benefits, you can still join ISHS as an Associate member for just \$30 plus processing.

Finally, I want to say that I am gratefully to have been the Society's Executive Secretary-Treasurer for the last 18 years and will continue to serve in this role through 2023. I plan to retire, though, at the end of 2023, and the ISHS Executive Board is currently reviewing potential successors to assume the management of the Society. 33rd Conference of the International Society for Humor Studies

University of Boston, Boston, Massachusetts, USA, July 3-7, 2023

The 2023 ISHS conference will be hosted by Patrice Oppliger at Boston University, the fourth-largest private university in the United States. BU is located in Boston near historic Fenway Park. The airport, train stations, historic sites, and entertainment venues are easily accessible by public transportation. Boston is a visitor friendly city and is served by most major domestic and international airlines.

The conference will take place over five days (Monday, July 3rd through Friday, July 7th) with morning plenary sessions followed by breakout sessions. In addition to the 4th of July fireworks (as much as I'd like to take credit and say they are specifically for the conference, the city of Boston provides the festivities), the conference will include an opening reception, comedy night, and banquet.

As for accommodations, there are several nearby hotels. As a more affordable option, the Student Village residence (StuVi-1) will be available for conference attendees and their guests. StuVi-1 is an air-conditioned apartment-style residence at 10 Buick Street with suite-style accommodations. Each suite is comprised of four single occupancy bedrooms, two bathrooms, a kitchenette, and common living room area. The building also has a rooftop lounge with a spectacular view of the city, several small study rooms, and a first-floor campus café and convenience store. The building is located right on the "T" (subway/trolley line) and adjacent to the Fitness and Recreation Center. The proposed housing rate for this residence is \$95.00/person/night for shared bath and \$167/person/night for private bath.

An all-you-can eat dining hall is also in close proximity to the conference venue. Costs are \$10/person for breakfast; \$15/per person for lunch. For those who do not wish to eat in the dining hall, there are a significant number of eating establishments located within a block or two of the meeting spaces.

The Conference website will launch in early January, and online registration will begin on January 15, 2023. The paper and panel submission deadline will be March 1, 2023. Forty-Ninth Annual Meeting of The Association for the Study of Play

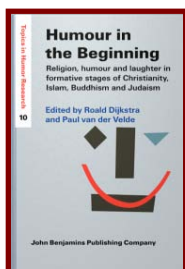
New York City, USA, May 17-May 19, 2023

Humor in the Beginning

From the Publisher: *Humour in the Beginning* presents a multidisciplinary collection of fourteen in-depth case-studies on the role of humour – both benign and blasphemous, elitist and ordinary, orthodox and heterodox – in early, formative stages of Christianity, Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism and (late-antique) Judaism. Its coherence is strengthened by four preceding theoretical essays, many cross-references and a conclusion. Thus, the volume allows for a methodologically sound comparison and explanation of historical views on humour in the world's most important religions. At first sight, the foundational period of religions do not seem to offer much opportunities for humour. A closer look on primary sources, however, reveals the ways in which people formulated answers to existing ideas on humour and laughter, in moments of religious renewal. Main topics include the incongruous nature of the divine, the role of anthropomorphism, superior and didactic humour, moderate laughter, responses from dissenters and the gap between religious regulations and reality.

Humor in Self-Translation

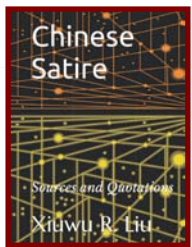

From the Publisher: This volume has been conceived to explore an important aspect of human existence: humour in self-translation, a virtually unexplored area of research in both Humour Studies and Translation Studies. A variety of international scholars has contributed to this volume by examining literary texts from several standpoints (e.g., sociological, philosophical, post-colonial, etc.) while others have examined this practice in contexts that are traditionally not associated with it, such as stand-up comedy and language learning. This book sheds light on how humour in self-translation can encourage reflection on social issues, challenge stereotypes, contribute to recast individuals in novel forms of identity, facilitate our reflection on our own sense of humour, and so forth. The book is accessible and engaging and can be of interest to advanced students and researchers in Translation Studies and Humour Studies.
