ISHS Conference



The 21st Conference of the International Society for Humor Studies *Long Beach, California, June 17-20, 2009*

Do not miss the deadline for proposals on March 1, 2009 for the upcoming 21st Conference of the International Society for Humor Studies. Scholars, professionals, and students are invited to submit 250 word proposals for papers, posters, and colloquia, and panels related to humor research. All prospective paper presenters must register for the entire conference and pay registration fees at the time that they submit their proposal. Presentations should be planned according to the following guidelines:

- Colloquia and panels should be designed for 75 minute sessions with up to four presenters.
- Individual papers should be planned for 15 minute presentations.
- Poster sessions will run for 75 minutes, and each poster will have a 4 by 5 foot space for presentation.

2009 Conference Awards and Scholarships

In 2006, the ISHS Executive Board established Scholarly Contribution and Graduate Student Awards to acknowledge individuals presenting notable humor research at ISHS Conferences. These awards include stipends to cover Conference fees, and up to four awards may be given annually, depending on available funding. Scholarly Contribution Awards (SCA) are intended to honor individuals who have made outstanding contributions to humor research through high quality publications, conference presentations, and other scholarly activities. SCA recipients present their research in a Conference plenary session. Any ISHS member may submit SCA nominations to the ISHS Awards Committee.

All ISHS graduate student members, planning to attend the 2009 ISHS Conference in Long Beach, are eligible to apply for a Graduate Student Award (GSA). As part of their conference application, interested students must submit (1) a letter of intent to compete for a GSA, (2) a description of their research program within humor studies, (3) a presentation proposal, and (4) all required registration materials and fees. GSA recipients present their work at a special session of the annual conference and receive (1) a certificate of achievement, (2) a stipend to reimburse their Conference registration fees, and (3) waived fees to selected ISHS-endorsed seminars and workshops.

Though the importance of humor both in and for religions is recognized, it has been rarely studied in a scholarly context. 1st International Conference on Humour in Conventional and Unconventional Politics (ICHCUP)

Dunarea de Jos University of Galati, Romania, 6-8 November, 2009

The first ICHCUP welcomes contributions on humor in political speeches, humor in political campaigning and political conferences, humor in parliamentary debates, humor and democracy, humor and leadership, military humor, humor in totalitarian societies, humor in wartime, political humor in the media, translation and political humor. In order to meet these objectives, the organizers invite contributions from both linguistic and related non-linguistic disciplines such as political studies, sociology, philosophy, media studies, cultural studies and psychology.

The main conference sessions will involve 40 minute talks (30 minutes + 10 minutes for discussions) and poster presentations. Contributions can focus on results from completed as well as ongoing research, with an emphasis on novel approaches, methods, ideas, and perspectives. Presentations should describe original, unpublished work. The number of submissions is restricted to one single-authored submission and one submission in co-authorship. Selected papers will appear in a printed volume.

The deadline for submitting abstracts is May 30th, 2009. Abstracts of 350-500 words should be sent to politicalhumconfr@email.com. Acceptances will be sent out by June 15th, 2009.

Potential contributors please contact the editors with a brief summary of the proposed article by April 15, 2009; submission of papers: September 15, 2009. Manuscripts may be 5,000-8,000 words. New Books on Humor

The Primer of Humor Research. Ed. by Raskin, Victor. Berlin: Mouton de Gruyter, 2008. (Humor Research [HR] 8); € 98.00 / US\$ 137.00; ISBN 978-3-11-018616-1

The book is intended to provide a definitive view of the field of humor research for both beginning and established scholars in a variety of fields who are developing an interest in humor and need to familiarize themselves with the available body of knowledge. Each chapter of the book is devoted to an important aspect of humor research or to a disciplinary approach to the field, and each is written by the leading expert or emerging scholar in that area.

Ermida, Isabel: *The Language of Comic Narratives. Humor Construction in Short Stories*. Berlin: Mouton de Gruyter, 2008 (Humor Research [HR] 9); € 98.00 / US\$ 137.00; ISBN 978-3-11-020514-5

The book offers a comprehensive account of how humor works in short stories, by presenting a model of narrative comedy that is pragmatically as well as semantically, grammatically and stylistically informed. It is the first study to combine a sequential analysis of the comic short story with a hierarchical one, merging together horizontal and vertical narratological perspectives in a systematic way. The book covers the main areas of linguistic analysis and is deliberately interdisciplinary, using input from philosophy, sociology and psychology so as to touch upon the nature, motivations and functions of humor as a cognitive phenomenon in a social context.

Ewald Hecker: *Die Physiologie und Psychologie des Lachens. Ein Beitrag zur experimentellen Psychologie für Naturforscher, Philosophen und gebildete Laien [1873]*. Ed. by Karl Pfeifer. <http://www.gutenberg.org/etext/27205>.

Karl Pfeifer's edition of Ewald Hecker's influential book on the physiology and psychology of laughter and humor makes a valuable historical source available for researchers everywhere. Hecker's monograph is important for the development of the modern psychology of humour, as he initiated a new perspective on the psychology of humour that includes clinical studies and psychological observation. Hecker's research was subsequently further elaborated by Emil Kraepelin and provided thereby the theoretical foundation of Sigmund Freud's *The Joke and Its Relation to the Unconscious*.
